October Meeting

Sue Miller, AAUW CA Public Policy





A large group of interested women met at the Lincoln Library on October 21 to hear Kathy Von Osten, our AAUA CA Legislative Advocate, share the results of the 2023 session of the California Legislature. Of our 40 pieces of priority legislation, 19 were signed into law, 3 were vetoed, and 18 were transitioned into two-year bills (meaning they will be raised again in 2024). Twenty-two pieces of our priority legislation made it to the governor's desk. With 19 out of those 22 pieces of legislation signed into law, we achieved an 86% success rate.

Kathy also explained the process for selecting bills related to AAUW CA's Public Policy Priorities. She monitors bills as they are submitted and works with the PP Committee Chairs to identify 70-75 that relate to our priorities. The bill list is divided among the committee members, who study their assigned bills and recommend whether to support (or oppose). The final list of 35-40 is determined through committee discussion. Each bill is prioritized into high, medium, or low, with the high category receiving the most advocacy attention.

One of our highest priority level bills, which we co-sponsored, was signed

into law: AB 1394. This bill seeks to help child sex abuse survivors remove their images from social media platforms, holding big tech accountable for design features that knowingly, recklessly, or negligently facilitate, aid, or abet child exploitation.

Two of our second priority level bills were also signed into law: AB 1071 and AB 1078. AB 1071 encourages school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools to provide teen dating violence prevention

(TDV) education to all pupils in grades 7-12. AB 1078 requires instruction in social sciences to include a study of the role and contributions of people of all genders, Latino Americans, LGBTQ+ Americans, and other ethnic cultural, religious, and socioeconomic status groups. 2023 has been a successful year for AAUW CA 's legislative advocacy! Thanks to Kathy Van Osten for her work on our behalf!

The AAUW CA School Board Project Welcomes Your Participation!

School Districts across the county have adopted conservative policies that ban books and censor curriculum based on the materials' depiction of inclusive and diverse perspectives, particularly affecting transgender students. This has happened in several districts in Southern CA, and locally in the Rocklin and Dry Creek School Districts. Governor Newsom signed AB 1078 into law, officially preventing school districts from banning books and censoring curriculum based on the materials' depiction of inclusive and diverse perspectives. Social sciences textbooks must include the role and contributions of people of all genders, Latino Americans, LGBTQ+ Americans, and members of other ethnic, cultural, religious, and socioeconomic status groups. The new law elaborates on specific requirements to which school districts must adhere, and financial and other penalties if the district is in violation. The state is already focusing on compliance. Attorney General Rob Bonta filed a lawsuit against Chino Valley Unified in San Bernardino County. Bonta was granted a preliminary injunction to halt the parental notification policy to protect the safety of transgender and gender-nonconforming students while the court case proceeds.

Because quality education is a key element of its mission, AAUW CA has initiated The School Board Project. Its focus is to find qualified candidates to run for school board positions in 2024, provide training for the candidates, and help candidates during their campaign. It is not certain at this point how school districts will respond to the new law. We anticipate that most will comply but suspect there are some that will not. It is important that our work continues since service as a school board member often leads to running for higher elected office.

There are opportunities for you to participate in this project. Do you know a qualified person who might want to run for the school board in your district? Perhaps a former teacher or principal or a parent who wants a quality education for their child? Would you like to help a qualified candidate become better known in the community during the time before the election? Women who feel unhappy with their salaries are less likely than men to

push for a pay rise, new survey finds by sbhaimiya@insider.com (Sawdah Bhaimiya)

- Women who are unhappy with their wages are less likely to ask for a pay rise than men.
- A new survey found that more women think their pay doesn't fairly reflect the work they do.
- Still nearly half of men who felt the same asked for a raise but less than a third of women did.

Women are still getting the short end of the stick at work when it comes to pay, but many still don't feel confident enough to ask for a pay rise, a new survey found.

Ciphr, a HR systems company, <u>surveyed 1,000 adults</u> working full-time in the UK in June found that over a third of men had requested a pay rise from their employers, but only 26% of women felt confident doing the same.

Almost half of men who were unhappy with their pay because it doesn't match their skills asked for a raise recently, but only 32% of women who felt this way did the same, per the survey.

Women also feel underappreciated with 45% saying that their pay doesn't reflect the experience, skills and value they bring to an organization and 44% said it doesn't reflect the roles and responsibilities they take on for their employers.

Conversely 49% of men feel their fairly paid for their skills and experience and just over half says it reflects their current roles and responsibilities.

Men who were unsure if they were being paid unfairly were still more likely to ask for a pay rise than women who were unhappy with their wages, the survey found.

As a result, women were more likely to say they can't afford to take sick leave and were more overwhelmed by stress and money worries than men, according to the survey.

Previous surveys have revealed that British women have historically felt less able to do much about their pay. Half of women in the UK lacked the confident to ask for a pay rise and were 25% less likely to do so than men in 2021, a <u>Glassdoor survey</u> found.

Glassdoor's career expert Jill Cotton told Insider at the time that this gap is partly due to a culture of secrecy around pay at companies, meaning many female employees are left unclear on what they should ask for.

"Companies should open an honest discussion around salary from the point that the role is advertised and throughout the person's time with the organization," Cotton said.

"Having clear salary bands limits the need for negotiation which, as the Glassdoor research shows, has a detrimental effect on female employees' ability to earn throughout their career."
